Taming The Devil

The Devil's Triangle is a **44 mile loop** along TN 62, 116, and 330. The twists feature steep drop offs and **rock cliffs**, along with narrow pavement and loose gravel shoulders. The ride offers up a blend of rural scenery, **mountain climbs**, and colorful history. One of the newest stops is Brushy Mountain Prison, a historic landmark that offers **ghost tours** and some wonderful **pub grub**. Stay near Norris Lake or Melton Hill Lake. Norris Lake State Park has rental cabins. If you prefer to RV and trailer, there are many campgrounds nearby.

Bloggers rate this ride as challenging and is not recommended for inexperienced or casual riders.

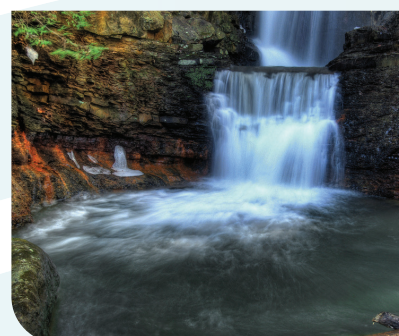
DAY
1

Check In. Take an afternoon to ride the **Hungry History Buff Trail** (170 miles and 4.0 hours.) This is an easy scenic ride and will take you to Utopia. Stop at the RM Brooks Store in Rugby for fried pie and pop. Continue your journey towards **Norris Dam State Park**. Plan your meal stop for either **Rickards Ridge BBQ** at Cove Lake State Park or at the **Clinch River Brewing** in the Norris Dam State Park. Rest up for a white knuckle ride on the Devil's Triangle.



DAY
2

Devil's Triangle - Start your morning with a hearty breakfast. Pick up the trailhead to the **Devil's Triangle** in Petros, TN. Gas up before turning on 116. The next 44 miles will be a ride of gut twisting climbs and steep drop-offs. Pass by **Brushy Mountain Prison** on your left or make this a stop for lunch or a tour on Thursdays through Sunday. Choose to loop back on 330 or stay on 116 to head back across **Norris Dam** on the **Norris Freeway National Scenic Byway** along SR441.



DAY
3

Check out. Cruise into Oak Ridge, the site of the **Manhattan Project National Historic Park**. Follow the Oak Ridge Turnpike to the K25 Overlook and Visitors Center. Stop to learn more about this vast complex and people that helped win WWII. Continue towards Kingston and stop at **Fort Southwest Point**. The reconstructed fort overlooks **Watts Bar Lake**. Fifty miles will take you through 200 years of history.
